DIDJANO DPRB

We closed off last month with some homework for the locals who get out and about upon the highways and byways of the village.

Firstly, two things that display the name Frank Victor Veness are the metal gates attached to the School of Arts Hall in Station Street and also upon a plaque attached to the central columbarium which is adjacent to the northern and circular wall of the St James Church building. A columbarium is defined, in part as a "sepulchral vault or other structures with recesses in the walls to receive the ashes of the dead".

Other "homework" made reference to the family name or surname of Huthnance. That name appears upon four plaques attached to the central columbarium. Two in particular are worth looking at more closely, those being Lionel Basil **Beetson** Huthnance and John **Beeston** Huthnance. Did the engraver make a mistake? We will never know. However J.J. Moloney makes reference to John Beeston who fulfilled the positions of both the local Post Master and Station Master, his son Thomas and another relative Dr. Joseph Beeston.

Beeston it is!

To continue with the theme of trying to determine some suitable names for the 23 new roads in the subdivision between the main southern rail line and the Hume motorway, reference has been made to more local names, local icons and local land use and environmental features. Sadly, some of the suggestions have been rejected by the Geographical Names Board (GNB). However, some of the names to be accepted include Moloney, Dharawal, Archie's Crossing, Berry, Beeston, Cattle Pastures, Sleepy Hollow, Dairy, Nettie and Halfpenny. In future issues of this publication, the significance of some of the names will be explained.

In this edition, our Church on the Hill gets a brief mention. Recently the question arose in general conversation, "Why is the small amenities building called 'The Stables'?" In the early days of St James the 1870's everyone went to church, it was a moral obligation. People stayed at home only if ill or it was "too wet for service" in which case the Rector's horse could not negotiate the slippery clay roads. Others also travelled to services by horse and buggy. Coachmen would unhitch the horses and then lead the horses to rest in the Stables. The Stables remained until 1930. The building now known as 'The Stables' was formerly a portable Landcom office at Narellan. Under some energetic drive and persuasion, particularly from Trevor Eirth, a former portable Landcom office became quite a comfortable and serviceable amenities building, well used to this day.

Trevor pushed very strongly for it to be named "The Stables" in recognition of the former structure that had served the parishioners from the 1870s to the 1930s. It was suggested by a local fellow who still attends the 8.30 am service, that a gap between the letter T and the Letter A in the word "Stables" should be considered. Then we could have been both St James and St Ables. His suggestion was not supported but his sense of humour was appreciated. The current amenities building was opened for use in 1999.


The station has also been a hive of activity as existing members maintain their training and a group of recently joined members commenced their firefighter training in preparation for their Bush Firefighter course.

New Australian Fire Danger Rating System Launched

In coming weeks a new Fire Danger Rating sign will be installed at Menangle Fire Station. This sign will reflect the new nationwide Australian Fire Danger Rating System which launched on the 1st September, 2022.

The new system provides a more accurate way of assessing and communicating the risk across the bush fire season.

The four levels in the new system are Moderate, High, Extreme and Catastrophic – each level comes with clear actions to take. On a day where there's minimal risk, 'No Rating' will be issued. Know the changes. They could save your life
