DIDJANO DPRB

Folk from Menangle and nearby gathered at our fire shed on Thursday 26th January 2023 to once again participate in Australia Day Activities. Our prime organizer, Sue Peacock, ensured that things ran smoothly. As well as the usual locals in attendance, it was good to see a smattering of new faces. As attendees mingled some informal questions were asked concerning our history and association with Australia Day celebrations. Early recollections are of locals gathering at the School of Arts in Station Street where local resident David Cutts and Donald Howard, the then Anglican minister from St James Church would read a selection of appropriate Australian poem and prose.

Certificates of appreciation were presented to people who had participated in local activities during the preceding 12 months. Light refreshments were served and consumed. By 1990, the new Fire Shed was up and running, the School of Arts building was deteriorating, and in due course our Australia Day activities moved from Station Street to Menangle Road.

It was overheard by the author on the day "Do other places in Wollondilly do this sort of thing and how many fire brigades are there in Wollondilly?"

It is not known whether other Fire Brigades host Australia Day Activities. However the second part of the question is quite easy to answer. There are 19 Bush Fire Brigades in Wollondilly Shire. In alphabetical order they are:

Appin; Bargo; Buxton; Cawdor; Douglas Park; Lakesland; Menangle; Mount Hunter; Oakdale; Orangeville/Werombi; Pheasants Nest; Picton; Silverdale; Tahmoor; The Oaks; Theresa Park; Thirmere; Wilton; and Yanderra. Wollondilly Shire is certainly a big Local Government Area. It is roughly 2560km² in area. Not all towns or villages have a Bush Fire Brigade. Belimba Park, Brownlow Hill, Glenmore, Maldon and Mowbray Park, to name just five don't have their own brigades, but are looked after by brigades from neighbouring towns and villages.

Wollondilly Shire came into being in 1906 and the name is taken from the Wollondilly River. Like many other eastern flowing rivers in New South Wales it has its origin upon the eastern slopes of the Great Dividing Range. Its source is at McAlister near Crookwell. It flows into and out of Pejar Dam. It winds its way through the Southern Highlands passing north of Joadja before flowing into Lake Burragorang. A distance of some 156 kilometers. The actual word "Wollondilly" has a few different pronunciations, spellings and leanings. It is generally accepted that the members of the Gundagurra Tribe used the word wollondilly to refer to "water trickling over rocks". Taking into account its journey through some very inhospitable, uninhabited and rocky landscapes, it is most appropriate to acknowledge this application of the word Wollondilly. It does have other meanings.

We started with a bit about Australia Day, and we will finish with another bit of Australia day that should probably be in Thommos Corner (or should that be Thomo's corner?) check your back copies. Australia became a nation on 1 January 1901.

The author's maternal grandfather was born on 4 November 1897. Technically was he actually an Australian?

FACT: There's an increased risk of grass fires this season!

Recent rain has caused extensive grass growth across NSW. As grass and crops dry out, they become more susceptible to fire. This means there's a **significant risk of large and destructive grass fires this season**.

There are things you can do to prepare for the risk of grass fire:

- Keep grass short. You can mow it, graze it or slash it back.
- Maintain your machinery- including mowers.
- Know where you can move your animals to safety.
- Check and maintain firefighting equipment like pumps and hoses.
- Make sure a fire truck can access your property- think about gates, bridges or obstructions.
- If you're using fire on your property, get to know the team at your local Fire Control Centre and find out if you need a permit.
