DIDJANO DPRB

Every now and then the name Menangle is mentioned in the news, in print or in oral recollections by former and current resident. From as early as 1795, Menangle can be linked to something or someone of importance, significance, or uniqueness. Gilbulla, Camden Park, The Store and St James Anglican Church come to mind.

In 1952 the Rotolactor was introduced to the district. It was an idea brought to Australia by Lieutenant-Colonel Edward Macarthur-Onslow. It operated for approximately 30 years. In an undated publication that recently came to light the author came upon a snippet with the title in large bold print: JOHN MACARTHUR'S FAMILY ARE SELLING A TOWN.

Guestimates put the article being composed in the 1960's as land area is described in acres, not hectares and prices are described in pounds (£) not dollars (\$). More research is being done to define the date of the publication.

The sleepy little village of Menangle, 30 miles southwest of

Sydney, stirred momentarily the other week, sat up with a start, then rolled over and went back to sleep again. This was the reaction of its people to the news their historic little nook would probably go under the auctioneer's hammer. "History for Sale" said the headline which announced preparations to subdivide part of pioneer John Macarthur's 9,000-acre Camden Park Estate.

It was the first news the 500 residents of the district had

heard of the scheme – although to most the Estate is their

own little world. Surrounding and including Menangle it is worth more than £1 million (pounds) at current land values. There is quite a bit more information in the article, however the contents of the final two paragraphs may bring a smile to the faces of our readers. The article concludes with the following: But the people of Menangle do not hurry things. While subdivision plans are still uncertain, they are going along with their daily work. They feel there is no need for them to worry about the future of John Macarthur's land – after such a long and stable past. (End of article) How times have changed. Now we do worry about subdivisions and their impacts upon our environment. Returning to the structures and people linked to Menangle.

We have the railway bridge over the Nepean River. The bridge dates back to 1862. More recently we have the Rubens, described as "An Australian Alternative Rock Band from Menangle". The current Captain of the Australian Rugby League team, the Kangaroos, is James Tedesco whose mother's maiden name is Finn, as in Finns Rd, and in all probability to Patrick Finn a pioneer settler.

Returning to the Railway bridge or as it is referred to in a publication dated 18 June 1963 "Menangle Viaduct". Recently the Editor and the Author enjoyed some time at The Store with three older residents of the district. Some of the discussion centred around jumping from the Rail Bridge into the river. The "Jumper" recalled doing this dare devil act after a prolonged period of rain and the surface level of the river was considerably higher than during periods of normal flow. This led the author to do a little research about the history of our unique Railway Bridge/viaduct, and that information should be forthcoming in a future edition of the Menangle News.

WHAT'S IN THAT TOWER? ST JAMES MENANGLE



Menangle village has the rare distinction of containing a peal of bells in its church tower. This distinction is usually reserved for capital cities and large towns.

St James tower contains eight bells ranging in weight from 138 kgs to 380 kgs and are in the key of A.

The bells are rung by the English method with a large

wooden wheel attached to the bell and a rope going to the level below the bells where the ringers stand. The bells turn through 360 degrees and each bell requires a bell ringer, (i.e. to ring eight bells, you need eight bell ringers). There is only one new bell cast for the peal and that is bell 4,(2003), six bells

coming from other UK churches, (one of these cast in 1806), bell number 3 was on a buoy in the ocean around England. They are a fine sounding peal of bells.

THE NAMES OF THE BELLS are from lightest, treble bell to heaviest, the tenor bell:

1 St Peter, 2 St Luke, 3 St Barnabas, 4 St James, 5 St Paul, 6 St John, 7 St Andrew, 8 St Jerome.

WHEN WE RING

We ring most Sundays 9.30 to 10 .00 am and usually practice on Wednesday evenings 6.00 to 7.30 pm. Apart from ringing on Sundays we also ring for special occasions: ANZAC Day, Australia Day and weddings.



A special day being called "Ring for the King" is coming on the 6th May 2023 for the Coronation of King Charles 111.

If you would like to learn to ring, we are currently recruiting, lessons are free. It is a very interesting hobby requiring physical and mental ability.

Hazards Near Me NSW' App

Over more than a decade, the RFS Fires Near Me NSW app has become a trusted source of information about bush fires in NSW. The app has now been upgraded and expanded to show flood incidents, with information provided by the State Emergency Service. The new version of the App is called 'Hazards Near Me NSW'.

Over time, more hazards will be added to the app, and additional features will be added.

The display of emergency information in a multi-hazard app was a recommendation of the recent Flood Inquiry, and the expansion of Fires Near Me into Hazards Near Me NSW builds upon the success and user base of the RFS app.
